SPINNIN' IN THE DRAWER

"Where Blues meets Rock meets Country meets Gospel" sell me a ticket, show me to my seat, stick a guitar in my hands. I'll be awhile."

Festivals. I was sitting at the folk festival booth in Madison, taking peoples' money and swapping it out for them with food tickets. Absentmindedly did I tap along with "The Reverend Payton's Big Damn Band" who was doing something on the bandstand behind me, tap, tap, tapping to the beat on my ticket seller's sort of a small tool box all silvery and

cheap – not made of durable metal at all – when up walked someone and asked if I was part of the band. Which made me look to see just exactly what was going on back there. The Reverend Payton was playing a mean kazoo while he played slide guitar on an old beat up (what else ?) something that looked like a National guitar – you know the one with the hub cap in the middle of it – that some guys lay on their laps, while others hang 'em around their necks. And there was a lady playing constant washboard, and a gentlemen playing a parade marching drum. Gazoo, parade drum, vocals maybe, guitar strumming, washboard scratching, and me at the ticket booth.

The CD cover – Family Owned – 1030 – describes itself as "What you might expect to hear if you stumbled on a meth lab way back in the swamps of Mississippi."

Roots music had come to Madison, Ind.

And none of this story would ever have been told had it not been for this tidbit: In the 2008 issue of *Blues Revue*, under *Bravo!* Bravo!, it lists the Reverend Peyton's Big Damn Band CD as one of the "most listened-to recordings in the Blues's Revues offices."

Stranger things have happened. But not often. Not with me on cash box.

Blues Incorporated White Collar Blues Skyward Records SEBI,LLC.

For me this was the discovery group at the Water Tower Festival this past hot, long, hot, dry, very hot summer. That lasted a long time too – giving us more time to go the lakes to swim and boat ride – if they weren't dried up, of course.

Always on the lookout for guitar players that do the blues as *I* like them, this group with "Blind" Billy Graham holding down the lead chores (yes that is his real name, although he's not blind – not with a name like that – he just plays with his eyes closed) – covers some familiar tunes – redoing them sounds more like they have been re-digitalized rather than having strove for a *new ,my way* interpretation. The result is a cd with songs that you can recognize without having to wait until the next day.

Titles such as: Willie Dixon's *Shake for Me*, Elmore James's *It Hurts me Too*, Stevie Ray's *Empty Arms*, Freddy King's' *Someday after Awhile*, and one from the pen of the Blind boy hisself – "White Collar Blues" that is mostly slide work on a national guitar, with vocal.

This is the final installment in the trio of CD's paying true-to-how-it-was tribute to female blues singers that graced the birth period of blues recordings between the 1920's and the 1940's. The pre-WW1 noises. When the world was still quiet: no air-planes, scarcely any automobiles, no central heat or air conditioning, no television, and radio was still new to most homes.

Anyway – covered here very ably, very well studied and practiced, with a voice honed to a magnificent edge (yes, I am in love again) – are 12 songs that could put the fire back in last nights drowned embers.

Startling with a Mamie Smith tune, *Down Home Blues*, horning into the Sippie Wallace song *Up the Country Blues* – about a man who liked her money but didn't like her, pianoing into *Separation Blues* with Bonnie Raitt – about another cheating man (did I mention that I might be in love *twice* here?), rolling with Eddie Green's *A Good Man is Hard to Find* –this is where that caramelized throaty voice growls in a way that could get me to crawl shows up -; little girl voicing her way thru Eubie Blake's *Handy Man*, and rocks on into George Thomas's *New Orleans Hop Scop Blues*, and on thru Victoria Spivey's *TB Blues* and *One Hour Mama*, Johnson's *Empty Bed Blues* (worth the price of the CD – and I am not commenting!) –into Alberta Hunter's *Early Every Morn*, and closing with Ma Rainey's *Yonder Come the Blues*. Definitely the best of the trilogy!

On this, Dave Gross' second CD effort, he shows enormous growth as a player, singer and writer. With influences as diverse as T-Bone Walker, Charlie Christian, Albert Collins and Danny Gatton, he molds his performances into his own voice, showcasing his impressive improvisational skills and technique on guitar, but never at he expense of the song. He is definitely a force to be reckoned with among temporary roots and blues guitarists."

Duke Robillard Recorded at "Duke's Mood Room" Pawtucket, RI.

Guitars played include,, among others, Duke's 1952 Gibson L-7C, a 1952 Gibson ES-350, a Gretsch 1956 New Yorker, a Gibson L-4, and Es-5, a Telecaster, a Stratocaster, and a really old Epiphone cowboy acoustic. All of the archtops were played thru an original 1964 Fender Vibroverb and all of the solid body guitars were plugged direct into a Fender Deluxe Reverb.

He also plugs amps built by Lou Rosano, who makes some of the finest custom amps around these days.

The thirteen songs offered here include one by Gatemouth Brown, *She Walks Right In;* one by Hot Lips Page, *Walkin' in a Daze;* one of T-Bone Walker's best known, *I Know Your Wig is Gone;* and the oft recorded *After You're Gone,* recorded most notably by Django Reinhardt. The other nine are penned by Dave Gross, and they move from the old swing style of the 30's or 40's to today's rock beats. *Swinging on all Six* is a great example. But he also moves fluidly into Chicken Pickin' guitar flurries that make you think from Blue to Paisley in a hurry.

A very good player, writer, singer, picker.

And barring some misfortune – we should be able to appreciate him for some time to come as he is only 23 years old. This guy is worth checking out,

Pinetop Perkins celebrated his 94th birthday this past July. Born in 1913 on the Honey Island Plantation in Belzoni, MS., he started playing guitar blues in 1927 but switched to piano after an accident injured his left arm. He has been on the road for eighty years.

He comments on his life at the beginning of this DVD saying: "I had a rough time, but I made it." He went solo in his eighth dec-

Along the way he worked as a car mechanic, taught lke Turner to play the piano, survived an explosion that damaged his hearing, earned a reputation as "quite a ladies man", held down the piano chair for 12 years in Muddy Waters band during the highest points of Muddy's career - replacing the great Otis Spann worked for three years with Sonny Boy Williamson on the King Biscuit Time radio show, toured with Robert Nighthawk, played with B.B. King, and not only toured the south with Earl Hooker but also cut a session for Sam Phillips' famous SUN label in 1953. That session is where Pinetop Perkins' version of Pinetop Smith's Boogie Woogie was recorded.

This hour-long look at Pinetop's life includes interviews with Ann Rabson, Bernard Allison, Bob Margolin, Bobby Rush, Bubba Sullivan — owner of the Blues Corners in Helena — Dr. John, Eddy Clearwater, Hubert Sumlin, Ike Turner, Kim Wilson, Koko Taylor, Lonnie Brooks, Marcia Ball, Mitch Woods, Paul Oscher, Taj Mahal, and Willie "Big Eyes" Smith, among others. A labor of love for each of them.

What a shame that his contemporaries - Pete Johnson, Meade Lux Lewis, Albert Emmons, and Little Brother Montgomery – all of whom helped develop the basic formats that today's swing, boogie woogie and rock 'n roll - are not still around to sit on stage with him and compare styles.

Included among the interviews on the DVD are 10 songs, Chicken Shack, to Ida B, to Perkins Boogie, to Kansa City, to Rather Quit Her Than Hit Her,.

Included with the DVD is a bonus live CD of Pinetop in Chicago, playing 10 great songs with help from Bob Stroger, Willie "Big Eyes" Smith, and "Little" Frank Krokowski. This package has become one of my favorites of the year and one of my most often listened to. This is a true piece of History - and would make a great Christmas Present for any Blues Fan whose stocking you are privy to!




Hoodoo Moon Kenny Neal Alligator Records 1994

Kenny Neal's Hoodoo Moon was his last release of a five record deal on Alligator Records. But he didn't just punch the clock on this one. All songs are well arranged and full of horns and keys to accentuate the rhythm, and of course, to set up and showcase the signature

aspect of Kenny's groove - his guitar. Through a solid mix of original and cover tunes. Neal represents again that he can hang with the other, albeit perhaps more famous, guitar greats. This calculated mixture of classic and contemporary blues tunes allows you to hear Kenny's full range of guitar expression and soulful vocals. Oh yeah, and the harmonica parts he throws in are pretty cool as well. I particularly liked the tune he co-wrote, "Money Don't Make The Man." This song reaches out to kids in the ghetto, raised in poverty, who are killing each other for clothes and shoes....

Sugarfoot Moanin' Michelle Malone SBS Records 2006

From the driving, bouncy opening tune to the low-down greasy electric purr of "Soul Chicken," Michelle Malone's latest CD gets and holds your attention from start to finish. Tunes on "Sugarfoot," all originals, sound as if they draw in part from Bonnie Raitt, Rory Block and Susan Tedeschi with its rough & tumble, joyful and full-throttle songs, anchored by an ultra-tight rhythm section, wicked slide guitar (played by Michelle), bluesy harmonica (also courtesy of Michelle) and gorgeous vocals (Michelle: who else?) that are part sandpaper and part silk.

Overall, this CD is roots and blues with a bit of funk, plenty of spunk and lots of grit -- Southern style. Pull these songs up by their roots and watch the dirt fall off. Michelle's forceful vocals sometimes give way to a surprising softer side, but underneath it all is the heart and soul of a gritty blues rocker who also knows how to croon and moan around a sensual groove. Her guitar skills are always on display, whether by way of a ferocious slide attack, energetic strumming or easy and tasteful lead work. And it's not all about instrumental and vocal power: Michelle's lyrics are clever, personal yet universal, sometimes poignant and sometimes biting -- and all sung in a southern drawl sure to make you melt.

Two other tunes, aside from those noted in the opening paragraph, need to be mentioned: the bouncy "Winter Muscadine" that just won't let you sit still for a second; and the growly "Rooster 44" with its alternating quick and swoopy slide riffs swirling around a rock-steady toe-tapping beat.

Personnel to note on this recording are: drummers/percussionists Kirk Yoquelet and Linda Bolley (with the latter also providing backup vocals), Garrison Starr, Shawn Mullins and Trina Meade--also on support vocals; Neilson Hubbard on keyboards and percussion and Aaron Sandes on the upright bass.

And, the album's great-sounding title just ices the cake -- Southern style, of course. "Sugarfoot" is a delight from start to finish.

Fake as the Blue M. Scott Horn M. Scott Horn 2006

The first time I heard *Fake as the Blue* by Scott Horn I did not like it. It seemed to me the music just kind of plodded along with little direction and the lyrics were almost unintelligible. But a wise friend once told me that you should listen to a CD at least three times before you decide if you like it or not. After one particularly frantic day at work I needed to listen to something that would help me calm down a little from my crazy day. I chose this CD to help me relax and it worked out very well. Listening to *Fake as the Blue* is like dipping your toes in a cool pond on a hot summer's day. It's quite soothing and relaxing. I was able to just let my bad day slide off my shoulders as I enjoyed Horn's laid-back acoustic guitar playing and calming vocals. I particu-

larly liked his version of Guy Clark's Don't Let the Sunshine Fool You, Robert Johnson's 32-20 Blues and Robert Pete Williams' Levee Camp Blues. If you are looking for some easy going acoustic blues this is the album for you. Find out more about Scott Horn at his website www.mscotthorn.com.

Energized Bernard Allison Ruf Records RUF 1113

It may be unusual to review an entire CD -- let alone a double album -- on the merits of one tune; so, that will only ALMOST happen here. After all, this 2-CD set of 16 songs by blues guitarist/vocalist Bernard Allison, recorded live at the Musa in Gôttingen, Germany, in October 2005 is an excellent work. However, the "side 2" opener, an instrumental entitled "The Walk" really shows just what this offspring of the late Chicago bluesman Luther Allison is all about -- at least as a guitarist. In fact, as well-respected and skilled a guitarist as he is, the younger Allison has likely never sounded better than he does here. This is the very essence of Bernard Allison, guitarist.

This tune could very well be titled "the jaunt," "the strut," "the boogie," "the bounce," and even "the run" (or sprint) as Allison's fret fingers and slide finger dance at sometimes breakneck speeds across the guitar neck. While Allison may not quite have his old man's harsh edge and capacity for long-distance and high-decibel lung power, he displays plenty of energy and musicianship. But that's putting it mildly.

"The Walk" is over 10 minutes of pure energy, skill and joy. This is rock and roll first, with blues elements infused within. Almost every slide lick known to blues guitarists is utilized here, and Allison's dazzling left hand fretwork sizzles -- moving from machine-gun speed single-finger note-playing, to single fret slide movements, hammer-ons, pull-offs and length-of-neck slide swoops -- in both directions. After a few minutes of this, visions of fire raining down upon the stage will be conjured, and comparisons with slide guitarist extraordinaire Roy Rogers will come to mind. But Allison ain't done yet -- he leaves all that in the dust. Also, all the while he remains well within the framework of the song's melody--showing that it's not just some wandering meaningless jam, but pure art and skill. When the tune finally ends, your finger is already on the repeat button, your air guitar reverie momentarily interrupted.

Actually, there are three tunes, all consecutive, on disc 2, which deserve the most ink here. The next two follow "The Walk," and also showcase Allison's guitar wizardry. "Step Down" could refer to tuning or to just simply taking a breather, as this "Amazing Grace" clone (just one verse, though, coming in at just 1:18) again displays why Allison is arguably one of the world's best at slide. While he plays this tune almost "straight up," his little nuances and personal inflections only add to the amazing power of this song. You'll get 78 seconds of goose bumps. The tempo revvs up once again on "Talking Guitar" which incorporates a lot of New Orleans-style funk as he "marches," then (literally, on his guitar) slides into "When the Saints Go Marching In." Sit in your chair while listening? Not! After that, Allison remains true to the song's title and makes amazingly skillful use of his wah-wah pedal and slide and causes his guitar to "talk." (Charlie Brown's teacher ain't got nothin' on this!)

Of course, this review would be remiss without at least mentioning other elements and tunes, even if only briefly. He does two songs originally composed by his late father (one on each CD: "Bad Love," and "A Change Must Come"). And if you are predisposed to a bit less flair and flamboyance, preferring more standard (albeit well-executed) fare, than the first CD will be more to your liking. And, it's there that his bandmates -- keyboardist Mike Vlahakis, bassist Jassen Wilber and drummer Andrew Thomas -- are most prominently featured. And they are good -- very good. And, back to CD number

two: song eight, "Don't Be Confused," about his father's influence, makes really cool use of reverb. And then Allison brings it all back home on the closer, another rocker, titled "I Just Came Back to Say Goodbye."

There's a little something for every blues and rock fan on this recording; however, if jaw-dropping slide guitar is your thing, this is well worth the listen and the price for just a few songs which show the instrumental essence a true master at work -- er, play.

Ghost Kings of Beale Street Chainsaw Dupont Big Productions, Inc

I heard one of the songs from this CD on XM radio and the guitar solo grabbed me. It wasn't a searing fast moving guitar, but rather a deliberate one-note at a time statement that had a feel to it that I could not ignore. I purchased the CD online and popped it in the CD player immediately after receiving it. As I should have known, the best song on the CD was the one they played on the radio.

The song I heard, "Alibis and Lies" is a somewhat spooky song which talks about the ghosts on Beale Street. It is at first a good song that grabs you with the music and then you listen to the lyrics. The riff that grabbed my attention started with a soft

picking of the strings with only a hint of the notes on the string. Then the notes jump out at you suddenly, only to return to the pick on the strings sounds-muted but having meaning.

For us guitar lovers, this CD is a must have, if only for this song. It highlights how the guitar can be use not in hot fast licks, but slower meaningful notes that can pull the listener into the music.

There are other songs on the CD which are really good. One thing that struck me though is that the group sounds a lot like Foree Wells on certain songs, if he were still alive. The group bills their songs as "Soul" Rockabilly", "Inspirational", "Blues" etc. There is something on the CD for most tastes, but blues seems o be the underlying message here.

This Chicago group has a great future and is worth following. The CD is an enhanced CD with lyrics, website links, etc. You owe it to yourself to check them out.

Stop the Game Deborah Coleman JSP Records 2007

Deborah Coleman has made quite a name for herself over the last decade-plus as a blues/roots/soul and funk artist (with some classic rock thrown in now and then). She's released another excellent CD called "Stop the Game," which showcases her soulful, throaty vocals, songwriting and excellent guitar playing.

Overall, this is a really good CD. Some of the tunes offer up some pretty standard stuff, although even when paring down to fundamentals, Coleman does it with as much skill as anyone and puts her own stamp on it as well. But when Deb Coleman is on, she is ON. Some of those "on" moments (and there are several) are interspersed throughout this 10-tune CD (of which

seven are Coleman originals), which is graced with some really nice photos of Coleman performing live in the artwork.


The opening cut "I Got to Know," written by Jimmy Morello, is a great kick-starter with Coleman's searing electric guitar weaving in and around this midtempo blues/rocker anchored by Neil Shull and Jerome Heitman's thumping rhythm & bass section. Actually, this is characteristic Coleman fare, with flawless guitar and a great sense of rhythm. Coleman is nothing if not a human groove herself. "Greezy" (mid-point on the CD) is a Coleman composition, which opens with a scratchy, old-fashioned-sounding acoustic slide guitar that gradually melds into Coleman's own playing of this jaunty country-blues-style tune backed by a fife-and-drum style beat. She even mixes the slide with a wah-wah effect a time or two for variety. And while the six-minutes-plus instrumental is a bit lengthy, it's pleasant melody and excellent guitar playing make it worth every second.

"Long Time" (written by Willie Edwards) is perhaps the most beautiful and melodic tune of the list. A bit sappy and corny lyrically, but Coleman pulls it off with her emotional vocals and equally soulful guitar.

And, finally, a great "bookend" to the opener is Coleman's own tune "Wagon Wheel" -- a finger-snappin', toe-tappin hypnotic groove with lots of repetitive notes and chords, some wicked fat-toned slide.

This CD was aptly named, because Coleman has always been, and is, a "game-stopper".

Albertville Corey Stevens Ruf Records RUF 1125

This is my first exposure to Corey Stevens. I listened to the CD a few times and the more I listened to it, the more it grew on me. It kept reminding me of someone that I had heard before. Then I put 2 and 2 together and figured it out. "Albertville" is a tribute to Albert Collins. All but one of the songs on the CD were either written by or covered by Collins.

Stevens' music and his band's music, could easily be mistaken as Albert himself (although his voice is markedly different). His style and delivery, guitar licks etc are *nearly* Collins copies- and that is good. He plays it differently much the same as everyone hears it differently.

Stevens plays guitar and sings and is backed by Steve Ferrone on drums, Kori Lynn Stevens and bass guitar, piano and clarinet, Paul Testa on Hammond organ, Aaron Wiener on trumpet, Max Felshem on sax and J. Cortez on tambourine. This is Stevens' fourth CD and his music is soon to be released in Europe.

The one Stevens original on the CD is "Another Pretty Face" and is admittedly one of the best on the CD. Albert would be proud. King's "I Get Evil", and "Got to Be Some Changes Made" are the King originals on the CD. Stevens covers some of King's more obscure covers which are refreshing. All in all, this is a fine CD and any Albert King fans out there would be obliged to pick it up and hear that his music still lives.

OLD SCHOOL SOUL

Does Louisville have soul? Definitely, but you need to judge for yourself when you listen to a new double CD produced by Butch Williams of RAW Productions and Ron Lewis of Mr. Wonderful Productions. Soulful Sounds of Derbytown Vol. 1 has equal doses of Doo Wop and R&B and will be issued on Dynamic Imperial Records this December. Only 100 copies of this test release will be pressed initially.

Louisville never had a distinctive urban musical genre driven by an influential record company like Cincinnati's King, Chicago's Chess and VeeJay, Detroit's Motown or Memphis' Stax sound. These recordings are a very diverse collection of talented groups feeding off the R&B, Doo Wop, gospel and soul sounds of the 50's, 60's and 70's. This was a fertile period in Louisville's African-American music scene. Musicians and singers started in their neighborhoods and schools and then gradually got out to play the local clubs and regional chitlin' circuit. They recorded their 45's on small local labels so wide distribution and national fame eluded them. Butch Williams has earnestly collected these rare recordings trying to preserve Louisville's black musical heritage. A portion of the proceeds from the sale of these records will be donated to the Kentucky Center for African American Heritage.

Cliff Butler has received the most recognition as a ballad and blues vocalist, D.J. on WLOU and bishop of his church, House of Truth. There is an interesting comparison between the smooth ballad "When You Love" and his version "True Love" which was done several years later. Little Pete & The Youngsters skillfully use his innocent high pitched voice especially on "I'll Never Leave You Again" which is reminiscent of Frankie Lymon & The Teenagers' "Why Do Fools Fall In Love." The Checkmates' "The Count" is a take off on Gene Chandler's "Duke of Earl." There is nothing wrong with getting inspiration from other people's songs so long as they are done well and these songs are. Donnie Murphy's "My Love For You" is one of those slow get out on the dance floor numbers that hits a high note at the end. Jerry Green turns up the gospel feel on "Save the Child" with a plea for social justice. Bobby Ledford digs into his soul bag like James Brown on "Make Love To My Woman." The Heartbreakers sweetly harmonize into your heart on "How Do You Say Goodbye." "New Gal" is a throw back to the small combo sounds of the 40's by Bobby Lester & the Moonlighters. The Aristocrats, who also backed up Little Pete, plaintively plead their case on "Be My Lady."

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The Royal Flush pulls out all the stops with strings, deep bass voice, choir and good lead vocals on "You Are Gone." The Black Pearls' strident "Something Special" bemoans "You give me the bottom, while you take the top." The Presidents was a band that dressed in tuxedos for their gigs and "I Want My Baby" has as much style as any of the songs on the disc. With a little promotion "Baby" could have gone big time. "Gold Walk" takes you from Ft. Wayne to New York on the same track as James Brown's "Night Train." "Baby, Baby, Baby" is an up tempo driving duet between Bill Locke and Joe Wells. The dreamy "Find Me" by Leroy Barbour nicely blends Leroy's soft voice with a flute solo. Ronny McCain is ready to give his girlfriend extra credit on "What Mama Didn't Teach You (I Will)." Curtis Wiggins & The Palm Room Band get into a nice sophisticated groove on "Stand Up (When I Talk To You)." The Faces of Truth cry out for affection on "I Need You Baby" as well as Godfather Strivers on a very similar "You Make Me Happy." The final cut by Baby Leon is simply "Love Is" and is a hauntingly beautiful way to go out on these wonderful CDs.

These songs are like a time capsule of harmonies being released again for all to hear. Butch and Ron are planning two more volumes in their Derbytown series featuring gospel and blues with songs by Helen Humes, Loraine Rudolph, Mary Ann Fisher and Preacher Stephens.

The CD will be available at ear X- tacy and Better Days and will be distributed nationally by CD Baby.
