On Monday, January 26, 2009, Louisville musician, Wayne Young, (far left with the Carnations c. 1959 and far right c. 2009), was honored for achieving his lifetime status in the Louisville Federation of Musicians (American Federation of Musicians). Young joined 14 fellow musicians in receiving their 25 or 50 year pins, as he received both the 50 year pin and lifetime status. The presentation was made by Joe Spain, current President of the Union at the Louisville Federation of Musicians AFM, 1436 Bardstown Road.

Young...began in 1958 with a local garage band, Chuck Harrod and the Anteaters. In 1959, he joined the Carnations (and Trendells), a union band, which began Young's 50 year membership in the union.

Young's diverse career has become a Louisville legend. His music tenure has included national tours with the likes of Bo Diddley, The Rolling Stones and Leon Russell, to name a few. The list of Young's career bands include Cosmo and the Counts, Soul, Inc., Commonground, Wayne Young and Company, The Heavyweights, Midnight Special, The Shufflin' Grand Dads... and his current band, Wayne Young and the New Legends.

The Kentuckiana Blues Society will hold its 2009 band competition on Sunday, June 14 at Stevie Ray's. We are having the contest earlier this year because in addition to the usual spoils for the winner of the contest which includes a berth to the 2010 International Blues Challenge, \$500 and local recording studio time, the band will receive a slot at this year's Garvin Gate Blues Festival. Our thanks to the Garvin Gate fest committee for providing the paid gig at this year's festival to the winner of the band contest. The solo/duo competition will take place on Sunday, June 28 at Lisa's Oak Street Lounge. The winner of this contest receives a berth to the 2010 International Blues Challenge, \$100 and local recording studio time. We have added one additional rule for the contests this year. No winner from the previous year can participate in the contest the following year. The winners of the 2009 KBS band and solo/duo contests will not be allowed to enter the same competition this year. For example, Tyrone Cotton and Danny Kiely won the solo/duo contest. They can't compete in the solo/duo competition but could return with a band for the other contest. 

### From Minglewood to Cyberspace

Sorry, but a curmudgeon can only keep his mouth shut for so long.

When it's late at night – or, in truth, very early in the morning and you're on the road you might come across one of those weird radio programs talking about UFOs, 2012, or ghosts. It happened to me again recently and they were talking about a "recursive universe." The theory, it seems, is that the universe is somehow curved in a way that all points lead back to either all other points or a beginning point. It was something like that, anyway.

Right after this was the inauguration of Barack Obama. And, when the closing benediction was said, it was déjà vu all over again (thanks, Yogi).

In that benediction, the minister said, "...we ask you to help us work for that day when black will not be asked to get in back, when brown can stick around ... when yellow will be mellow ... when the red man can get ahead, man; and when white will embrace what is right." Sound familiar? It should. In 1951 Big Bill Broonzy recorded a song called, "Black, Brown, and White Blues;" and in it he sings: This little song that I'm singin' about, people you know it's true If you're black and gotta work for a living, this is what they will say to you, they says, "If you was white, should be all right, if you was brown, stick around, but as you's black, hmm brother, get back, get back, get back." The connection was amazing for a number of reasons: 1) The lyrics of a 1951 Blues tune had morphed into a Gospel benediction; 2) no one in the media made the connection!

Blues, it seems has become so ubiquitous as to have disappeared. Of course, there is the other sorry side of this as well. When Big Bill recorded this song in 1951 (in Paris, by the way) his role as a driving force in Chicago was all but over and he had been "rediscovered" as a useful tool of the American Left. Much like Leadbelly, this once urbane gentleman of the Blues was reduced to making a living by appearing before CPUSA rallies singing of oppression and racism. Leadbelly was forced to eschew his suits for bib overalls and a straw hat, suffering this public humiliation silently. I guess it was only seen as exploitation when the other side was doing it. Sixty years later, roots forgotten, the shell of the Blues continues to be exploited. And so it goes.

Little did we realize that when John Lee Hooker cut that Pepsi commercial and it ended with the lady leaning out of the window musing, "Is this the end of the Blues as we know it?" that we were being given a glimpse into a future of the Blues where its form has consumed its function.

Here's an example of that: about fifteen years ago I hosted a cable access program for the Society called, "Back to the Blues." On one episode a local musician, a blues player not a Bluesman, announced to me that he was going to play a Robert Johnson song – his favorite one – for our putative audience. I asked what he was going to play and he responded, "Police Dog Blues." Now, Robert recorded a total of 29 songs and I was sure that "Police Dog Blues" wasn't one of them. In fact, I knew that it was a Blind Blake record from 1929, seven years before Robert even sat down in front of a microphone! So, I asked the musician – as politely as possible – if he was sure that the song he was about to play was a Robert Johnson song, that I didn't remember Robert recording it. He insisted that it was. Rather than continue to question, I watched as he proceeded to play a very credible version of an example of East Coast/Carolina Blues with some nicely done fingerpicking.

So what's the point? What's such a big deal that a major "blues player" on the Kentuckiana scene at that time (he shortly after this headed to more appreciative cities and venues) did not know a Robert Johnson song from a Blind Blake one – or a Delta Blues from a Piedmont one? Does it matter that we know that Blind Willie McTell recorded "Little Delia," or Furry Lewis did, "Frankie and Stackolee?" Or the difference between Robert and Tommy Johnson, or what makes Skip James so intriguing? Who was the "Masked Marvel" and why should we care? Who were the "Paramount All Stars," or the "Georgia Cotton Pickers?" And what is so special and amazing about the latter group's version of "She's Coming Back (Some Cold Rainy Day)"? I mean, unless there's a Country Blues category on Jeopardy, what's the point?

Well, it's that whole recursive universe thing – the end is in the beginning and the beginning is in the end. Listen to Skip James singing "I'm So Glad" to hear the prefigurement of Clapton and rock; or, listen to BB King's "One Kind Favor" to know the hurt and despair of Blind Lemon Jefferson freezing under a Chicago viaduct. The Blues is like a Moebius strip, endlessly looping. But, if you cut it you reduce its mystique to one dimensional sameness, boring and bereft of wonderment. Sure, you can listen to what passes ("if you're white, should be alright") and even score it an "85, because it has a good beat and you can dance to it;" but it has lost its power to fascinate, engage, and give you a glimpse into unimagined places.

To borrow an old timey phrase, "you done got above your raisin'." And, in so doing, we lost something very precious. But, the wildly unlikely confluence of technology, entrepreneurship, and talent has saved our "raising" like the precious contents of a maiden's hope chest. We have only to open it and listen. Listen to Charley Patton (the Masked Marvel), to Tampa Red, Blind Blake, and Papa Charlie Jackson (some of the Paramount All Stars), or to Curley Weaver or Barbecue Bob (the Georgia Cotton Pickers). Listen to Furry sing about Frankie and Stackolee and then pull out Lloyd Price's Stagger Lee, or any of the others. And, when you venture out in these tough times to spend some money on a live show, have some fun, and try to listen between on behind the notes and the beats for those flashes of Skip, Charley, Robert, Tommy, Son, Peetie, and so many, many others. The Blues will never fail to surprise you.

### Always Terry Hanck VizzTone Records CD-TVR405

Terry Hanck's 5<sup>th</sup> release is one on which he has written all 12 songs himself. He is a saxophone player and vocalist from the San Francisco Bay area, who has put together a fine CD with great songs. I was a convert to sax in the blues by Keith Crossan of the Tommy Castro band a few years ago. Hanck performs his music in much the same way that Crossan does, lending a new dimension to the songs that does not overpower the songs and yet fits in so well that you won't be

able to imagine these songs without it.

Hanck's songs are very tasteful and his songs are well written and performed. His producer on this CD was Chris "Kid" Anderson who also played guitar on several of the songs. Locals may remember him as the guitar player for Charlie Musselwhite at the Madison Ribberfest, who now plays for Little Charlie and the Nightcats. Other guest performers are Elvin Bishop on guitar, Steve Berlin (Los Lobos) on baritone sax, Jimmy Pugh and Bob Welsh on keyboards, and Tracy Nelson on background vocals on one song.

Hanck admits that his songs are stylistically from a time frame from the 1950's to the 1970's. His song "Quicksand" will transport you back to the 1970's. Tracy Nelson sang this song on the soundtrack of the 2005 motion picture "Forty Shades of Blue" with Hanck playing tenor sax.

I have listened to this CD several times and the more I listen to it the more I like it. This one comes recommended

### Luck in a Hurry Scissormen VizzTone Records CD-BK-003

Playing a mixture of grunge, North Mississippi hill country, rock and punk-infused blues, the Nash-ville, Tennessee-based Scissormen present their first internationally distributed release. Eleven tunes make up this CD (which includes nine originals), anchored by the fiery and spooky slide guitar playing Ted Drozdowski--who draws upon his musical mentors and influences like R L Burnside, Jessie Mae Hemphill and Junior Kimbrough as well as his own improvisational skill and psychedelic rock background. He is joined by guest artists drummer Billy Conway, blues pianist Teo

Leyasmeyer and vocalist/frontman Dicky Barrett. The somber darkness of these tunes cradle a constant high energy, whether the tempo is screaming-full-steam-ahead or more introspective and slow. Throughout, the greasy, sometimes monotone slide gives one pause to consider music with which to score horror films, perhaps. Nevertheless, this group is talented, the production well executed and these guys play blues rooted in tradition but with a definite eye--and ear-towards the future. And they play as if life itself depends on it.

### Alone Again With Friends Kate Hart DWMC Music

For all her impressive accomplishments (visit her press and biographical materials), Kate Hart's new CD just doesn't quite live up to the rest of her billing. It's not bad--it's just that it's nothing to shout about, either. No new ground is broken over these 14 tunes, all originals (so

kudos to Kate for that). And, yes, it is blues--although held up by a large dose of urban swing and rock. And, of course, Kate can really "belt one out" with a range from soprano to near contralto. There are enough "finger-snappin'-toe-tappin'" tunes on this CD to at least keep the mood-and body--movin.' BUT...the woman sometimes can't quite hold the note steady (especially when she tones it down a notch or two); there's a bit too much reference to food and sometimes the backup vocals sound, well, "cheesy." In a word (or four): almost, but no cigar.

Delta Groove Records has released another great CD with this harp player. The CD was recorded live in Edmonton Alberta, at the 9<sup>th</sup> annual Labatt Blues Festival. This California native has become one of the premier harp players around. On this CD he is joined by Tom Lackner on drums, Steve Nelson on bass, Jimmy Calire on piano and John Marx on guitar

The CD is well recorded and the choice of songs is excellent. His live stage presence is infectious. There are 10 songs on the CD and they include a couple of his hits that have gotten a lot of airplay- "Whiskey Drinkin' Woman" and "Wake Up and Worry".

I usually listen to CD's a few times before I try and form an opinion of them. I put this one on for the first time late one evening (actually it was early one morning) and was spellbound. I stopped what I was doing and sat down and listened to the CD. This is good stuff. There are few CD's that capture the essence of live blues like this one does. His harp automatically puts me in a laid back bluesy mood. I was paralyzed and in the "indecision abyss" trying to decide whether to put the CD player on "Repeat 1 Track" or "Repeat All".

OK, for those that haven't figured it out, the artist is Mitch Kashmar and the CD is "Live at Labatt". This one I think surpasses his two other CD's that I have, "Wake Up and Worry" and "Nickels and Dimes". Also, if you haven't figured it out, I highly recommend this CD. Put it on, kick back with your favorite drink and enjoy.

### Steady Movin' Carlos Del Junco Northern Blues Music NBM0051

Del Junco, a Canadian, has won the Maple Blues Award for harmonica seven times and the Hohner Harmonica championship gold medal in Germany twice. He has also been

nominated for the Juno Award for Blues Album of the Year. His techniques includes playing chromatically on a diatonic harmonica by using a technique called "overblow" taught to him by a jazz virtuoso Howard Levy.

Del Junco starts off the CD by grabbing your attention with a song called "Diddle It". Right out of the box he proves that he can blow the harp. The following song is a bit of a let down. His version of "Dull Blade" is rather uninteresting. "Jersey Bounce" the third song, is likewise. Finally, on the fourth song he turns to some interesting music. "Mashed Potatoes Canada" features the vocals of John Dickie who reminds one of Jimmy Hall with his soulful singing.

"Movin' Down the River Rhine" is a Sonny Boy Williamson tune done with harmonica only with limited-between breaths vocals. "Paradise" is an interesting song that has catchy lyrics. "Amazing Grace" is a song that starts off very boring but then has an interlude of faster moving harmonica, then slows down again to an uninteresting pace. It too is harmonica only.

In general this music is slow, sometimes very slow, jazzy harp with very little backing with other instruments. I am a big harp fan, yet I found most (not all) of this music uninteresting. There is no question Del Junco can play, and maybe jazz lovers will like this CD. I would however, admire the really cool CD cover and then put it back on the shelf.

### Chase The Sun Chase The Sun Independent 2007

This ain't yer daddy's blues, bloke. This Australian-bazsed independent band's self-titled debut simply uses blues as a springboard to get to other places. Yes, there is some

old-school blues, Stevie Ray-influenced Texas boogie, fingerpicking country blues and even a nod or two to Hendrix. CTS and its sound is anchored by guitarist extraordinaire Jan (rhymes with Yarn, according to press information) Rynsaardt, who mixes it up with some acoustic blues here, rough and raspy vocals there, and some of the most amazing guitar work you'll hear almost anywhere over the 12-track song list. And Rynsaardt's skill with a slide is second to none (listen to tracks four and ten, for emphasis). This is a CD whose content almost defies description. You'll simply have to listen. And, for a bit of PR fun: "All up, a cracker of an effort for such a new band, and an indicator of things to come." Yeah. What he said.

### Hey Sugar Gina Sicilia VizzTone Records CD-SNVT-009

This Philly-based songbird has expanded on her debut CD by adding elements of folk and even country (more on that in a moment) to her blues foundation on this new release. Sicilia's soulful, smooth, silky alto voice is as sweet as ever--powerful when necessary and easy when the mood calls for it. The entire CD--all 13 tunes--are polished and professionally executed, but not overproduced in order to allow Sicilia's star shine bright. Few dull spots can be found in this recording; how-

ever, it would be nice to hear her "let go" more often, rough it up some and expand her vocal range a bit. She does this on a couple of tunes, and does it so well it leaves you wanting more. Sicilia handles all the true blues tunes with ease and professionalism, like the slow burning opener "Goin' Home Baby" and especially the gritty "Lowest of the Low" (the CD's best tune) where she wrings every ounce of emotion from the songs. Her country offerings are track 12 with her rendition of Dolly Parton's "Coat of Many Colors" (which is a decent effort, but not dazzling by any means) and "What the Moon Could Never Do." The latter tune is exceptionally well done, even right down to the lyrics and melody--and lacks only an affected country accent. If she could pull that off, Sicilia would have a top country hit on her hands. As it is, the entire CD is a big hit.

### Beautiful Bonnie Bramlett Rockin' Camel Music 2008

however, it would be nice to hear her "let go" more often, rough it up some and expand her vocal range a bit. She does this on a couple of tunes, and does it so well it leaves you wanting more. Sicilia handles all the true blues tunes with ease and professionalism, like the slow burning opener "Goin' Home Baby" and especially the gritty "Lowest of the Low" (the CD's best tune) where she wrings every ounce of emotion from the songs. Her country offerings are track 12 with her rendition of Dolly Parton's "Coat of Many Colors" (which is a decent effort, but not dazzling by any means) and "What the Moon Could Never Do." The latter tune is exceptionally well done, even right down to the lyrics and melody--and lacks only an affected country accent. If she could pull that off, Sicilia would have a top country hit on her hands. As it is, the entire CD is a big hit.
