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

Letter From The Prez

There will be plenty of blues to go around this year for Derby Week. Lamont Gillispie will host his blues harmonica jam at Gerstle's Place on Wednesday, May 2. On Friday, May 4, Lamont and 100 Proof will take part in the first Derby Eve show at the Vernon Club along with Little T&A and the Stray Cat Band. That show will get started at 9:00 pm. Admission is \$10 but KBS members will receive \$1 off when they present a current membership card. That same night, Tee Dee Young will host the Poor Man's Derby Party in Lexington. Stevie Ray's will feature their weekly blues jam on Tuesday, Blonde Johnson on Wednesday, V-Groove on Thursday, the Predators on Friday and the KingBees both Friday and Saturday.

After a two year break, the Musicians Emergency Resource Foundation (MERF) is bringing the Booty Shakin' Blues Benefit back to Stevie Ray's. The show will take place on Friday, May 18. Music starts at 7:30 pm with the River City Blues Band followed by Wayne Young and the New Legends at 9:30 pm and the Dirty Church Revival at 11:30 pm. There will be raffles and t-shirt giveaways. All proceeds will benefit MERF and local musicians.

The festival season gets started in Owensboro, KY on Friday and Saturday, May 11 and 12 with the International B-B-Q Festival. The festival, a celebration of smokey meats, offers all kinds of music including blues. Their website is http://www.bbqfest.com/. The first Old Louisville Spring Fest will take place at First and Ormsby on Saturday, May 19. The festival is a benefit for Kosair Charities and will feature eight acts including the Walnut Street Blues Band (7:00 pm), the Mr. Wonderful Production Band (8:30 pm) and Little T&A (9:45 pm). More info can be found on-line at http://www.oldlouisvillespringfest.org/. That same day Pitt Academy will have their 28th annual barbecue festival on the Preston Highway school grounds. The blues schedule is still coming together but the headliner this year is Grace Askew from Memphis, TN. The Blues Between the Bridges festival returns to Riptide on the River in Lexington on Sunday, May 27. Starting at 2:00 pm and featuring seven bands, this year's headliner is Muddy Water's eldest son Mud Morganfield. The third annual Germantown-Schnitzelburg Blues Festival is Friday and Saturday, June 1 and 2. The festival will take place in the block next to Check's Cafe, is a tribute to the late John Carby and a portion of the proceeds will benefit the American Cancer Society.

Notable events for May include the Washington County Disaster Relief Fund Benefit at the Salem Speedway in Salem, IN on Friday and Saturday, May 11 and 12. The relief fund was established to help the recent Washington County tornado victims. The benefit will have over 30 bands including Dog House Kitchen, the Travlin' Mojos and the Jimmy Davis Band. The music starts at 4:00 pm on Friday and noon on Saturday. Admission is \$10 each day or you can purchase a two-day pass for \$15. More information is available by calling 812/972-4214. Blues guitarist Joe Bonamassa will be at Lexington's Rupp Arena on Friday, May 11. Jonny Lang is appearing at the Horseshoe Casino in Elizabeth, IN on Saturday, May 12. This is a rescheduled concert from one canceled in late 2011. Bonnie Raitt and Marc Cohn are at the Kentucky Center on Sunday, May 13. And if you've never seen them before, the Charles Walker Band of Milwaukee, WI returns to the Hideaway Saloon on Saturday, May 19. The band, who play a mix of blues, funk and R&B, passes through Louisville three to four times a year and always plays at the Hideaway. Songwriter and band leader Charles Walker shows the way on keyboards and tenor saxophone and gets plenty of help from the beautiful and talented Porsche Carmon on lead vocals. The music usually doesn't start until after 11:00 pm but they always put on a good show. They have a website at http://www.walkerband.com/.

Only a few weeks remain for bands to apply for this year's KBS band contest. The deadline for applications is Tuesday, May 15. Thanks to sponsorship from Four Roses Bourbon the cash prize has been increased to \$1,500. The contest is Sunday, June 3 at Stevie Ray's. DMR Music & Recording Profile

Ask Dana Roy, founder of DMR Music in Charlestown, Indiana, when he started making music, and he'll tell you there's hardly been a time when he wasn't.

The son of a radio newsman and broadcaster who had played trumpet in high school, and an opera-loving mother, the now 50-something Roy grew up in a suburb of Los Angeles surrounded by music, television and broadcasting.

In the early years of high school, he had a garage band that blanketed the neighborhood with the sounds of '60s rock and roll and the blues. A few years later, guitar in hand, he migrated to the San Francisco area, where he pursued music-making on the weekends while studying marine navigation during the week.

When he swapped San Francisco for Santa Barbara, he took along his growing collection of guitars, along with a newly acquired Merchant Marine Master's license. For the next 16 years, he made a living piloting marine tugboats and running a home restoration business, but he continued to perform with a series of bands and collaborators who appeared in large and small venues all over California. He had been writing songs for quite awhile by this time, and had become seriously interested in the recording process. Early attempts at recording song demos led to experimenting with engineering and recording other musicians. Aided by his father's professional colleges as

well as the Los Angeles musical community, Dana continued to develop his skill. The first studio, the classic converted house, was assembled in Santa Barbara's Sycamore Canyon.

Fast forward two decades. Now relocated in Louisville with a master's electrician degree and computer network specialist under his belt, Dana was ready to take music making to a new level. He had already converted his St. Matthews house into a studio and he had learned what worked ... and what didn't. This time, he was determined to build an acoustically superior space with the very best equipment.

He had ample skills on which to draw. Years of home-restoration projects had honed his construction skills (and equipment) to a professional level, and his training as a master electrician had provided him with unique expertise on which he could draw when selecting, installing and operating highly sophisticated equipment. Throw in 30 years of performance and song-writing, and he knew he was ready. He began construction.

In 2005, he met Mike Lynch, a bassist with Louisville's da Mudcats and a veteran engineer at Al Fresco Studios. The two soon discovered that their skills complemented one another, and that they shared a love of helping others make music. Roy and Lynch wanted others to feel totally at home in the studio, which would free them to make the kind of music they wanted to maka.

"Recording," says Roy, "is the art of being comfortable in the studio and forgetting that the recording process is occurring while you're playing. It's an exhilarating feeling to hear the sounds in your heart and in your head come back at you in the studio, and we believe it's our mission to help you do so."

Thus was born DMR Music. "We do all kinds of things," Roy says, "including the blues, R&B, jazz, smooth jazz, folk music, worship music, rock n roll, and country and all kinds of acoustic music. We work with cover bands, writers and original material, and we have lots of experience with voiceovers, whether commercial or karaoke."

The studio was designed with music performance, recording and broadcast in mind, and DMR Music can record, mix and master onsite.

Decked out in his trademark Hawaiian shirt and flip flops, Roy presides over an analog Sound Craft with British EQ for its frontend console, going into a Macintosh Quad-Core Tower controlled by ProTools 9. The Live Room features a removable wooden "dance" floor which can be utilized for both vocal and acoustic instrument recording, as required. He points out that one of the finest attributes of the studio is the Auralex engineered acoustic wall and ceiling treatments which have enhanced the quality of the studio.

Years of performing and recording his own work taught Roy that the total environment is just as important as the equipment. Comfortable accommodations, plenty of space and a homey low-key atmosphere contribute as much to the ambience as does

DMR's "backline" of several guitar amps, an amazing bass rig, Korg keyboard and Yamaha drums. There is also both easy and adequate access for artists to load in their own favorite gear to the Live Room.

DRM Music works on a personally scheduled appointment basis, and no project is too large or too small. Well-written, - arranged and -rehearsed projects can be completed in a timely fashion, which means lower recording costs. On the other hand, the studio stands ready to collaborate with artists looking to write original material and create a new sound from start to finish in the studio.


Rates start at \$25 hour; larger projects are negotiable, depending on experience and readiness. Advice and assistance on copywriting is available.

DMR is located in Southern Indiana, 15 miles from downtown Louisville. The studio just completed the "Take a Chance" album, with the Doghouse Kitchen band, DMR's first full album in the new studio. Other current projects include John & Jason Burgard's "Jason and the Fossils" and Da Mudcats.

Roy looks to the future with real anticipation. His future plans include DMR Publishing for original writers, You Tube video recordings and postings, and live web casts.








New Music Reviews!





Chuck Leavell Back To The Woods Evergreen Arts

Chuck Leavell was recruited and hired by Ian Stewart of the Rolling Stones back in 1982 due to his boogie woogie/barrelhouse piano playing prowess. That piano style has been a trademark of the Stones sound since their beginning and Chuck has kept that spirit alive both onstage and in the studio ever since.

Back To The Woods is a 15 song tribute to the pioneers of blues piano and includes covers of artists such as: Little Brother Montgomery, Leroy Carr, Otis Spann, Ray Charles, Memphis Slim and several other blues piano greats.

The entire disc is an upbeat and heartfelt tribute to these artists and their music. Chuck's playing brings new life to these songs and highlights the style and energy that defined them in their heyday.

Keith Richards guests on Leroy Carr's Evening Train and Otis Spann's Boots and Shoes. John Mayer lends his guitar playing to Memphis Slim's Wish Me Well and also plays on Boots and Shoes. Randall Bramblett adds some very tasty sax to three numbers. Danny Barnes and Col. Bruce Hampton also lend a hand on a few tracks.

Many times guitar players get the most attention when discussing the blues, but this disc is a refreshing and enjoyable focus on the piano players who helped define the genre before the guitar became prominent.

Sean Chambers Band The Long Island Blues Warehouse Live Blue Heat Records

This live recording of the Sean Chambers band is reminiscent of the late Gary Moore or Popa Chubby, both in song selection and guitar prowess. Chambers is definitely a blues-rocker.

Of the 10 songs on the CD, 7 are originals written by Sean. Covers include "Full Moon on Main Street", "Dust My Broom" and "Crazy for Loving You". His version of "Dust My Broom" includes a

pretty good rockin' slide guitar and harmonica.

All but one of the songs comes from Chamber's earlier CD's. The exception is "Hip Shake Boogie". Those of you that are fans of Gary Moore or Popa Chubby will like this one.

Fiona Boyes Blues For Hard Times Vizztone/Blues Empress

Sixteen great tunes make up Australian blueswoman Fiona Boyes' latest CD "Blues for Hard Times," produced by harmonica player Kaz Kazanoff (who performs as a guest on this recording). The CD is a fairly stripped-down, traditional album mixing electric, acoustic, solo and small band efforts. You'll hear north Mississippi hill country, Piedmont, country, Delta, Chicago, and ragtime blues, with some nice

slide playing from Boyes and special guest Bob Margolin.

Two things stand out right away: vocals and guitar. This would have been an excellent recording without any of the guests--although they certainly enhanced it quite nicely. Boyes' warm-toned finger-picking guitar, and at times some slide work, and her husky, sometimes gritty and growling voice, really carry this entire set list. These songs cover the traditional stuff of the blues: lust, love and longing, partying, drinking, and a bit of religion and spirituality for good measure.

All the songs are excellent, and there are few which really stand head and shoulders above the rest. Some titles bear special mention, however. "High Time," featuring Kazanoff's crossharp style of harmonica playing and Boyes' "fat" tone finger-style guitar; "Baptised in Muddy's Sweat," featuring Bob Margolin's greasy electric guitar; the longing of "Maybe I Could Be Your Girl," on which (according to press materials) Boyes' plays a lap slide guitar she borrowed from Cindy Cashdollar (herself a slide legend); and the somewhat spooky/spiritual closing number "Jesus Took Possession," written by countryman and singer-songwriter Chris Wilson.

Boyes has once again proven she is a major force in the blues world--male or female. Her guitar playing and singing have spoken, loud and clear.

Ruthie Foster Let It Burn Blue Corn Music

Big-voiced Ruthie Foster never seems to stray far from her musical roots--gospel and soul. While some would call her a blues artist, it might be more accurate to place her in

the gospel, roots and soul fusion category.

On "Let it Burn" (Blue Corn Music), Foster's pipes are as strong as ever and her gospel influences are buoyed by the presence on several tracks of her special vocal guests, The Blind Boys of Alabama. Some of these tracks, such as the opener "Welcome Home," which Foster penned, are produced for a big, uplifting mood and sound. Others, such as the somber, spooky "Lord Remember Me," another Foster original, use the same choral techniques--but much darker in tone.

Highlights include the above-mentioned opening song, and "Everlasting Light," by Daniel Auerbach and Patrick Carney, a gospel/soul tune showcasing the power of Foster's voice and some greasy pedal steel slide from Dave Easley. Near the end, she evokes the image of a Southern Baptist minister/singer and settles into a funky/gospel groove. Doubt she stood or sat still during this portion. The Blind Boys join her yet again on Foster's arrangement of "The Titanic" (sometimes titled "God Moves on the Water"). Again, absolutely powerful! A capella, simple gospel/soul/blues featuring Foster's chilling, sometimes growling and forceful voice. This one will raise bumps all over you.

Some of these tunes are simply interesting. Her cover of June Carter's "Ring of Fire" and Pete Seeger's "If I Had a Hammer," are, well, unsettling. It just seems odd to hear the syrupy, slow treatment of the song made famous by the late Johnny Cash, and her smoky/jazzy/minor chord rendition of "Hammer" is not bad--still, it seems strange hearing this arrangement. Robbie Robertson's "It Makes No Difference," is quite nice -- a gospel style, organ-driven and harmonious tribute to one of The Band's leader's signature tunes.

So, while Foster seems to somehow straddle and include blues in this set list, it would be a stretch to place it squarely in the middle of that genre--maybe on the edge. Regardless of where you put her, though, one thing's for sure: The girl can "preach!"

Ruff Kutt Blues Band Mill Block Blues Ruff Kutt Records

First let me say that proceeds from the purchase of this CD will be donated to the Handy Artist Relief Trust (HART). That is reason number one for purchase of this

CD-a good cause. Reason number 2 is because this is one of the best blues CD's of the year. Let me elaborate. The CD is a tribute to the people who worked in the Cotton Mill Block in north Texas. This is not a prison or a ghetto. It was a housing area of people who worked hard for their money. All of the songs are original and were written to tell the story of those

people. The artists on the CD were assembled from around Texas to inject the true Texas style. One of the more recognizable names that plays on the CD, and in fact produced it, is Anson Funderburgh.

There are 13 good songs on the CD. There are 14 good artists on the CD. That works out to 182 reasons to like this CD. Funderburgh's influence (and guitar playing) are evident from the first track. The sax, played by Ron Jones, is a real plus in the songs, and the accordion of Christian Dozzler lends some Cajun sound to some of the songs.

When I first listened to the CD, I thought the first song was great. Then the second song was too. The third track, "Drown on Dry Land" features Michael Schaefer's exceptional vocals and is my favorite. All of the songs are original. The song "Oh Lord" is a spiritual with the soulful singing of Shurhonda Kemp and is the only departure from the type of music exemplified by Funderburgh's music.

The bottom line is this: It is essential that you buy this CD. If you are a Funderburgh fan, then you don't have a choice- you must buy this. Of the 24 CDs I have reviewed this year, this one may be the best.
