### LETTER FROM THE PREZ

For eighteen years the Henderson Music Preservation Society, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, has been bringing a week's worth of great blues music in mid-June to Henderson, KY. This year is no exception for the W.C. Handy Blues & Barbecue Festival with several established and up-and-coming artists as Bernard Allison, Chubby Carrier and the Bayou Swamp Band, Ana Popovic, Chad Nordhoff and Big James and the Chicago Playboys. But the festival could not continue to operate without sponsors and contributions from blues fan like you. See how you can help by visiting the Handy Blues Fest website at handyblues.org. The festival runs from June 7 through June 14.

If you are unable to attend the Handy festival you can still get a flavor of it by visiting Stevie Ray's the same week. Both Ronnie Baker Brooks and Zac Harmon are appearing in Henderson, KY and will make stops in Louisville. Brooks is scheduled for Tuesday, June 10 at Stevie Ray's and Harmon will be there on Thursday, June 12. Not to be overlooked is local favorite Velveeta Jones, winner of the 2007 KBS blues contest. They are also appearing at the W.C. Handy festival on Saturday, June 7 and will play the early show at Stevie Ray's on Friday, June 13.

Our thanks to the hearty souls who braved the cold, windy and wet weather the weekend of May 16 and 17 to attend the Jefferson-town-Crusade Blues Bash and Festival and the Pitt Academy Bar-B-Que Benefit. We signed up a dozen new members and raised \$542 for the blues society. For those of you who did not attend the Pitt Academy Benefit you missed a great jam at the end of the night when several bluesmen took the stage including David Harrod, Mike Lynch, John Burgard, George "Harmonica Red" Heard, Dave Schmitt, Bob Hopps and Erik Shields. The skies opened up and the rain came down but they kept on playing.

There are two new blues jams in town. In May Jim Masterson and members of his band started a Wednesday night jam at Zena's Cafe. The music starts around 9:00 pm. Starting this month the Pure Gravel Blues Band will host a jam at The Lounge on Thursday nights from 8:30 to 10:30 pm. The Thursday jam is an early evening event and will not clash with the later evening jam at the Longshot Tavern. The Lounge is located at 947 East Madison St near the intersection of Madison, Chestnut and Wenzel. The easiest way to get there is to go down Baxter Ave to Chestnut St, turn left and drive four blocks. The bar will be on your right.

This issue of *Blues News* has our first call for entries to this years blues contests. The winners will represent the blues society next year in Memphis at the International Blues Challenge. That's winners, as in plural, because we will have both a band and a solo/duo competition. Details are available at kbsblues.org or by calling me at 502/724-9971.



### Lady Strings the Blues

Lauren Ellis. Now, there's a name you don't hear every day. Maybe some of you never heard of her. Make that likely most of you never heard of her.

Ellis is a singer, songwriter and guitarist who specializes in playing slide (on what I think I recall is a Jay Tarser electric) and writing original material. A California native now splitting time between Nashville and Florida, this diminutive attractive blonde can also be found working in Rock Block Guitars, a guitar repair shop in the Music City when she's not on the road (although her tour itinerary doesn't appear to be too up-to-date).

Raised in a musical family whose patriarch was a symphony violinist, Ellis' entire life has been basically immersed in music. Some of her influences include Duane Allman, Elmore James, Bonnie Raitt and Lowell George, as well as Lindsay Buckingham, Bob Weir and Joni Mitchell—although some of those influences are not always apparent in her playing.

In the early 90s, she got world-traveling road gigs with the likes of Nell Carter, Rita Coolidge (who continues to sing today, and can do some great blues numbers), Joe Simien (a Zydeco artist) and others. Ellis was a member of an all-female country band called Way Out West, where she played guitars and lap steel (of course). She worked the Los Angeles club scene during that decade as well, fronting the Scarletts and offering up obscure Motown, R&B and Memphis soul tunes. Soon, she was also opening shows for artists such as Mary Chapin Carpenter, Etta James and even Bonnie Raitt.

Her discography, although quite limited, showcases her excellent lyrics and sand-paper & silk voice, along with her swoopy and sometimes attack-style slide work. Her two recordings are "Push the River" (1999) and "Feels Like Family" (2004)—both of which won awards, and the latter mixed by renowned engineer (and spouse) Jake Niceley. The tunes on these CDs prove she can be bluesy, a little folky, and also really rock out as well as craft gorgeous melodies.

Not only an excellent musician, Ellis is approachable and personable. I had the privilege of seeing her at the Bourbon Festival in Bardstown a few years ago, where she had the unenviable slot of playing before the much anticipated Kentucky Headhunters (headed up by an excellent slide player, Greg Martin, who many of you likely DO know). She never batted an eye at this, and proceeded to lay down track after track of her own jaw-dropping slide riffs and gorgeous soulful vocals. I was

also privileged to see her performance at Douglas Corners in Nashville (somewhere around the Bourbon Fest time, I think), which was videotaped and eventually wound up as part of her "Feels Like Family" CD. I have several stills from that very enjoyable evening.

Something else of interest to note: her myspace web page mentions that she can (or could) be heard as CMT's "Crossroads" theme music composer and slide player.

If you ever get a chance to catch this great guitarist, singer and writer in a rare performance (even more rare up this way), please do yourself a favor and be sure to go. And stop and talk to her.

### SWEET MAN IS GONE A Maxx Maxwell Mystery

Peggy Ehrhart is a former college English professor who lives in New Jersey. She plays blues guitar with bands in the New York/ Tristate area. She is an award winning mystery writer and has also published in the field of her academic specialty, medieval literature. She is a longtime member of Mystery Writers of America and Sisters in crime.

Johnny Nashville is a talented blues guitarist who is "heartbreakingly handsome" – and he has lots of girlfriends. He plays in Blues singer Maxx Maxwell's band. At least he did until his early demise: he fell from a ninth story window. He was tall for a blues guitar player and so the ninth story windows had to be taller, or he wouldn't have gone out easily.

With clues such as this one laying all around, Maxx Maxwell works her way around the police line and becomes best buddies with the cops, offering them advice from the large number of clues she finds. She has newly found esteem that tells her that she is "smart, talented, and gorgeous – at least since she had her nose fixed, went blonde, and bought a push-up bra." She is a bass player in the book, but in real life the author is a blues lead guitarist. Some readers may perchance wonder if punitive underwear helps one to bend guitar strings in real life?

This 245 page book takes you on as many good roads as bad ones, there is even a car chase or two. There are enough well developed characters to make you wonder if they all moved to New Jersey from Appalachia. It is not a bad book. It is a genre book. But she never once mentions fuzz tones or ninth chords, or amplifiers, or string gauges but she does manage to name drop for the big stars and mentions a few of the better known blues songs.

Many department stores/grocery stores - or whatever they call those large places with all the stuff in there that you don't really want after you get it home - are selling guitar and amp combinations for beginners; each one of those combinations should also have this book in it to inspire would-be players. Remember when you thought that playing guitar in the dark meant the big times were upon you? This book could help keep the belief alive that "being in a successful blues band" could happen to anybody at any moment. And maybe it is.

### Right as Rain Gia Ciambotti New Light Entertainment

Gia Ciambotti has a long and successful career as a backup singer for more artists than one can count. Now, she's released an album of her own and, in a nutshell, the title says it all. Always a stellar support singer, Ciambotti is even better now that she's the shining star. Raw and sweet at the same time, tough and gritty, her vocal range never suffers for all this and she holds nothing back. Her smoky soulful voice is better at the mid and even lower ranges, but somehow, she finds that extra gear to reach the higher notes and does it amazingly well.

One might wish to draw comparisons from time to time, and you'd be right in doing so: Bonnie Raitt (#4, only a little rougher around the edges), Melissa Etheridge (#3, #5) and even a hint of Cher (#5, without the exaggerated enunciation). Ciambotti's voice gets to you – it goes deep into places that haven't even been named yet. And her southern drawl (from a California girl? Go figya) makes it even nicer.

However, as taken as you'd be with her voice, there are other aspects of this 11-track CD which also capture your attention. She either wrote or co-wrote 10 of these tunes with co-producer Ned Albright, who is a genius for taking instrumentation and vocals and putting them together to create just the right spirit, atmosphere and mood. And, he also seems to like slide guitar, because there's plenty of it thanks to the talents of Doug Pettibone. The guy plays lap and pedal steel, Dobro, Weissenborn and also mandolin and electric and acoustic guitars. And also listed in the credits is "Dr." John Ciambotti (Gia's father) on bass. He's joined by Herman Matthews on drums for that special brand of bump and grind necessary to keep things swampy and rootsy.

Every song is its own gem. Just when you think you've heard the best, the next tune plays and that becomes an instant fave. Having said that, though, the title track, with the spooky, rich and shimmering slide work of Pettibone; the toe-tapping third track, which showcases Ciambotti's lung power and lyrical skill and the next track, a spooky and sparsely produced number – those three seem to be the songs requesting the most attention from an overall point of view. It's certain you'll find your own favorites – maybe all 11.

And let's not forget lyrics. Ciambotti is a great songwriter, as is Albright. They execute perfect teamwork where writing is concerned; and her solo efforts are also excellent. The only lament about this whole deal is that there's not a lyric sheet. (It would make sharing lyrics for a review so much easier. However, that is merely an excuse to listen to them again.) The aforementioned track 3 (Tail Wags the Dog, an Albright-Ciambotti co-write) is likely the best effort of the list. The hip-swaying beat with Pettibone's electric lap slide underneath it all is a perfect "bed" for this "thinking-outside-the-box" tune: "Add the laws of nature—to the rules of attraction—It's a powerful sum—where the ways of action—speak louder than words—and talk is cheap. Well that's what I heard when you're fast asleep—Where the tail wags the dog and a mouse stalks a cat—Where the snake feeds a frog—upside down is where you're at..."

And "See Your Dreams" (also a co-write with Albright) is a beautifully written piece: "...Just roll with the wind You know it might lift you up so you can See your dreams as they unfold visualize the future they hold. Trade your pony for some wings and listen when your heart sings."

There's something different, something special about this CD. It feels very much like the birthing of a dream. And it sounds like not just a wonderful singing voice, but also a beautiful singing heart.





### Mississippi Number One Eden Brent Yellow Dog Records YDR1616

This winner of the 2006 IBC has been playing music for some time (do you remember her playing at the presidential inauguration in 2005?) but has waited for Yellow Dog to record her in 2008 for this, her first release since winning the IBC. This is her second release, the first was in 2003. Brent is an accomplished pianist who learned to play under the tutelage of Abie "Boogaloo" Ames. She and Ames toured the Mississippi area together for years. Ames is her senior by many years and she soaked up his life's music and honed her skills while with him.

Brent is from Greenville Mississippi and lived on State Highway One (thus the name of the CD). Her mother and father were both musically inclined and got her off to her start.

There are 15 songs on the CD, most written by Eden or her late mother who the CD is dedicated to. Her music is a blend of jazz, soul and blues. It seems like some of the music is jazz while the vocals are blues on the same song. She has a very identifiable voice that goes well with the music. Several of the songs are just her singing and playing the piano.

I like good piano blues and this CD certainly has some songs that fit the bill. A couple of songs, though were so slow and sedate as to be uninteresting to me. Overall this is a pretty good, well produced CD for this young artist. She has the voice and the skills, but not the fire of say Marcia Ball or Honey Piazza. I'm sure we'll be hearing more from her in the future.

Hope Waits Hope Waits Radarproof Records

This self-titled CD has all the earmarks of something that should be creating an amazing groundswell of "underground" attention. This is a great CD, but that's getting ahead of things here—for a moment, anyway.

First, take artist's the name. Hope Waits. What a name. Begs the inevitable and obvious questions, doesn't it?. So does the tiny record label. (And internet research proves it's tiny). And just look at the cover art: Big-headed caricature of female beauty (with the oversized eyes, as well), reminiscent of the

last Norah Jones CD cover art (only bit cuter, actually). Just an FYI: the art is done by Deana G. Conn, and a bit of internet research on her reveals numerous portraits just like this one.

Now, for the music. This says that all those other things were just (very sweet) "icing" on the cake. But they sure did the trick – create not only desire to pop that disc into the ol' computer, but also a NEED to do so.

The first notes of the very first song on her self-titled debut create an instant – and lasting – positive impression: Hope's voice is a sultry moonless New Orleans French Quarter midnight in July. If you've been there on a humid summer evening, you'll know. If not, you'll feel it, anyway.

There are some similarities to the aforementioned Norah Jones throughout the CD, and perhaps that's because producer and co-writer Peter Malick has also produced Jones' work. The entire CD is very southern, very rootsy and bluesy (with some jazz thrown in for good measure). It's got plenty of New Orleans jazz and parade march feel to it, a tiny hint of Cajun here and there and even a touch of folk rock. All this comes from a North-Louisiana-born gal who recorded all these songs in a Southern California studio.

The 30-year-old sings with a sensual drawl that sometimes melts into a throaty purr or a tough near-whisper – always soulful and emotional. Her vocal delivery and songwriting skills are maximized under Malick's expert tutelage and wizardry. He even brings out the young woman's intrinsic sense of rhythm in each song – whether it's the slow and sexy old-style jazz/blues opener ("I'll Be Satisfied"), the gentle snarl of the jilted lover on the next tune ("You Crossed the Line"), or the spooky New Orleans funk-n-blues "Get Behind the Mule" which is enhanced by Malick's own ghostly-sounding slide guitar playing. And just to keep it "honest" for true grit blues fans, there's even a tune called "Mother In Law Blues" (Robey) that sounds a lot like a slightly slower "Dust My Broom."

Waits co-wrote four of the tunes on the CD, three with Malick (who penned "You Crossed the Line" as a solo effort). The rest are covers: her two best efforts among those are a slow, slinky and sexy version of "Come Rain or Come Shine" (Arlen/Mercer) and an incredible rendition of Bob Dylan's "Ring Them Bells" which is almost a cinch to make ol' "Zimmy" actually break into a rare grin. Yeah, it's that good.

The whole CD is "that good;" you'd have to try for weeks, months, to find anything amiss here – and you'd come up with zilch. Hopefully, Hope won't have to Wait long for her success. Hope-fully, her record company isn't its own self-fulfilling prophecy and gets plenty of notice in spite of its name. Want something great to rave about? Just listen to this CD. It's a done deal.

Dirty City F&F Blues Project Indie

The Florida duo of Frank Magli and Frank Hurlburt has recorded a CD that is a real mix of types of music. Mostly rock but with some good blues too, there are 15 songs on the CD. Notable blues songs are "I Bleed Blues", and "Dirty City", "A Matter of Time", and "I Been Here Before". The others are more rock with one, "Kentucky Whiskey" a ZZ Top sound alike. One song is a real mystery to me-"Ain't Gonna Be A Blue Christmas". This song is really out of place on this CD.

The musicianship is actually quite good on the songs, and the recording is good too. It is a pretty good CD if you're undecided on whether you want to hear rock or blues.




